HIGHLIGHTS





We've had such a great year!





We started tutoring programs in math and reading comprehension. Through individual learning experiences, our students are receiving the analytical skills required for the construction trades.

The Southwestern Illinois College
Precision Machining Technology
(PMT) mobile lab came to introduce
machining technology to our students.
This exposure to additional workforce
opportunities inspires our students to
think of a future with possibilities.







We incorporated field excursions during our Summer Work Academy. We visited several sites, including the 126th Air Refueling Wing at Scott Air Force Base where our students were exposed to a variety of construction related careers within the Illinois Air National Guard.

Our field excursions also consisted of fun, team building activities such as indoor rock climbing, laser tag and bowling.





Our students learned so much during the summer!



We participated in a 2-week Painter's Workshop conducted by one of our volunteers, Mr. Larry Marler, owner of "The Works." Students learned the intricate details of proper equipment and materials set-up, detailed site preparation, and the painting techniques necessary to perform a nearly flawless paint job.







Our students built dog houses using an instruction manual created by our Construction Programs Manager. We conducted a 3-day workshop at the Christian Activity Center where our students worked with middle schoolers to complete the construction of the dog houses.





These dog houses are available at an affordable price to the residents of East St. Louis through our community partner, Gateway Pet Guardians.



Bricklayers Local 8 of Illinois came during the Summer Work Academy to introduce our students to the trowel trades. They also joined us at a 2nd Saturday working with students and performing masonry restoration on one of our rehab home projects.

Lansdowne Community Initiative (LCI) is a non-profit organization serving the Lansdowne community of East St. Louis. In partnership with Unity Lutheran Church, their mission is "changing the community by changing the community." They do this by providing new homes, renovating existing ones, and providing financial education. LCI and R3 have been working together in the renovation of a duplex house and a triplex apartment. Earlier this year, we finished one of the duplex apartments. We invited Welcome Home Ministry from O'Fallon, Illinois, to collaborate with us by furnishing the home and helping the family move in. Apartment #2 is 90% complete with the goal of moving a new family in by the end of the year.









R3 accepted an invitation from the City of East St. Louis to partner in a civic beautification initiative. The first project was in support of Mayor Robert Eastern's initiative to create a School Safe Zone around East St. Louis Senior High School. R3 organized its traditional 2nd Saturday volunteer workday in collaboration with city employees, community organizations, residents, and R3 students and volunteers to clear brush and debris, pick up trash and paint houses along two city blocks facing the high school. With this project, 75 volunteers completed work tasks on 13 properties (12 houses, 1 vacant lot) in 5 hours. It was a fantastic day and we are looking forward to our next project in collaboration with the city!

STUDENT STORIES

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Jordan W., joined R3 for the Spring 2021
Internship. He credits R3 with helping him
decide on a career in the construction trades.
Jordan has already been offered a job at \$22/hr
with a residential painting contractor. He is
currently enrolled in the Highway Construction
Careers Training Program to, in his words,
"broaden my knowledge of construction and
make myself more valuable to my prospective
employer."

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Maleah P. joined R3 for the Spring 2021 Internship. She initially hated the thought of daily R3 construction math class, but made the effort to plow through. Maleah graduated high school in May 2021 without clear plans for her future and decided to continue with R3's Summer Work Academy. During an R3 field excursion to Scott Air Force Base, she received inspiration from a female Air National Guardsman. She is currently pre-testing for the ASVAB exam and now sees the benefits of those R3 math classes. She hopes to join the Air Guard and be trained as either a Boom Operator on a refueling tanker, a Medical Technician, or Civil Engineering Support Tech. Her future plans are to use the Air Guard's educational benefits to attend college for nursing.





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Marquez W. and McKinley L., two young men from East St. Louis who graduated from the SWIC Highway Construction Careers Training Program, honed their skills while working with R3 student interns and skilled tradesmen on the R3 housing rehab projects in East St. Louis. In collaboration with our partner, the Lansdowne Community Initiative, R3 provided temporary jobs, helping them establish their careers in the trades. Both young men are now card-carrying members of trade unions (Iron Workers and Carpenters).







FINANCIALS

Profit & Loss (YTD)



As we enter the final quarter of 2021, we are tremendously thankful for all the ways God's funded His mission in East St. Louis. This includes your support! Thank you! Furthermore, we are confident in the Lord's provision through the remainder of this year and beyond.


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Profit & Loss (YTD)

- Revenue: We are behind budget by a total of 15% this includes donor revenue (-46%), and real state revenue (-66%). Grant revenue has stabilized our impact tremendously reflecting 33% above our goal. Note: we received and expensed the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan in 2020, which was forgiven in 2021 and is reflected as income (\$42k) in the attached financials.
- Expenses: We are 2% behind our budgeted goal (See Chart No. 2). The following categories and percentages reflect the over/under relative to our goals: fundraising (-25%), community programs (-50%, Note: a community partnership significantly reduced our cost for youth wages), operations (+12%) & staff costs (even).
- Relative to our 2021 budget, we report a <u>-\$41,464 shortfall</u> through Q3. This is typical of R3, and many non-profits, because we rely heavily on year-end fundraising.
